### LC 0901 Civil Procedure Code:

**Objectives of the Course**: The Civil Procedure Code, 1906 is subject of daily use by the Civil Courts and lawyers. Students cannot afford to have scant knowledge of civil procedure when he goes out to practice as a lawyer. It is necessary to have good grounding in the subject before one enters the profession. The substantive law determines the rights of persons affected by action. The main objective of this course is to give to a student a thorough knowledge of procedural law especially related to working of civil courts and other adjudicating authorities.

### LC 0502 Family Law I:

Objectives of the Course: The personal law applicable to Hindus, Muslims, Christians, Parsis and other denominations is not fully codified. While these personal laws are similar in their essential broad underlying principles, they are much different in their details. Personal law is applicable not only to aspects of family relations, viz. marriage and divorce, support and maintenance, children and their custody and guardianship, adoption and the like, but also to law relating to property, viz. joint family systems, devolution to property upon death of a person. The differences in the provisions applicable to different denominations arise from the history and growth of these laws over centuries.

This course covers the history and development of the principles and provisions of different personal laws, and the sources from which these laws are derived. It primarily comprises the laws applicable to family relations: marriage and divorce, maintenance, alimony, adoption and guardianship. It also lays emphasis on the general law applicable to all persons: the Special Marriage Act, 1963 and the Foreign Marriages Act, 1969. The course familiarises the students to the differences in the various systems, and to understand the reasons, merits and demerits of the various provisions. Study of this subject should enable the students to view family law not merely as a separate system of personal laws based upon religious beliefs, but as one cutting across religious lines, eventually enabling fulfillment of the Constitutional directive of Uniform Civil Code.

### Yashwantrao Chavan Law College, Pune BA.LL.B Vth Moot Court Problem No.1 2020-2021

Maharajya is and has been an agrarian economy. After Maharajya gained Independence in 1947, farmers used to sell their products direct to the consumers. But due to prevailing system of Zamidars or money lenders, farmers were trapped in perpetual debt. Farmers need to buy seeds, fertilizers and other things required for growing a crop, for buying all these things you need money so farmers took loans from Zamidars or money lenders who used to charge a very high interest rate on the principal amount. Farmers were unable to pay such a hefty amount and in such cases to get their money back money lenders or the Zamidars used to buy the whole produce of the farmers in consideration of very less amount to farmers as farmers did not have the bargaining power. Next year, the farmers again required money for taking new crop forcing them again to borrow money from the same Zaminadars. In this way the farmers trapped in a vicious cycle of debt.

To check this exploitative system, government of Maharajya introduced APMC (Agriculture Produce Market Committee) Act in 1960's. It was the time when the green revolution was in progress and many experts believed that the APMC Act played the major role in green revolution. APMCs set up Mandis or Markets across Maharajya where farmer's produce was sold. There are around 7000 APMCs in Maharajya at present.

Now, the process of selling the produce is that after harvesting crops are brought to the Mandis or Markets where they sell the produce through auctioning or price discovery. Whom are the farmers selling the crops? Not to the government but the middlemen or Arhatiyas. Middlemen are people between the farmer and the retailer or big traders. For example, farmers sell their vegetables to the middlemen and then the vegetable vendor buys vegetable from the middleman, vegetable vendor will not buy directly from the farmers. Government gives license to these Middlemen; shops, storage facilities etc. are provided to them in APMC markets. Many people work in these APMCs, there is storage of grains, so it requires laborers, accountants. So overall it is a self-thriving ecosystem. One thing which should be noted here is these APMC markets are regulated by state governments, a tax is charged on each transaction so in a way government knows at price produce is being sold.

Now what about the produce that are not bought by the middlemen in these markets? This is being bought by the government at MSP (Minimum Support Price). MSP is constant throughout the country. MSP also ensured that produce bought be the middlemen were not below a certain price. When everything is so good are farmers happy? According to National Crime Bureau report 2018, 1,34,560 suicides were reported in Maharajya out of which 10,350 were farmers



remember this was total number of reported cases. This system was good seeing 1960's but with time we need to evolve similarly, not much was done to APMCs and some problems popped up. Middlemen started exploiting farmers they formed cartels or an understanding among themselves and started buying the produce at MSP only and sold to traders at a high rate. For example, MSP for onion is Rs.8.5 per kg (data as of February 06, 2019) but we buy onions at Rs 35 – 80 per kg depending on state. In a way we can say Minimum Support Prize became Maximum Selling Price. Voice arose from time to time to remove these defects and in response government brought the three Acts in 2020.

- 1) Farmers (Empowerment and Protection) Agreement on Price Assurance and Farm Services Act, 2020
- 2) Farmers' Produce Trade and Commerce (Promotion and Facilitation) Act, 2020
- 3) Essential Commodities (Amendment) Act, 2020

These three farm Acts came into force in July 2020.

These Acts envisage bringing changes in some of the key aspects of the farm economy—trading in agricultural commodities, price assurance, farm services including contracts, and stock limits for essential commodities. These Acts sought to bring much needed reforms in the agricultural marketing system such as removing restrictions of private stock holding of agricultural produce or creating trading areas free of middlemen and take the market to the farmer.

Kisan Morcha, a registered society working for protection of farmers rights, filed a PIL in the Supreme Court of Maharajya challenging the Constitutional validly of all the above-mentioned Acts. The case is now fixed for the final arguments.

File an Application under Section 482 of the Code of Criminal Procedure, that to challenge the charge-sheet filed in the Court of Judicial Magistrate in pursuance of FIR registered with non-applicant 'X' for offences punishable under Sections 354-A(1)(iv), 509 and 107 of the Penal Code, 1860 and Section 67 of the Information Technology Act, 2000.

As per the FIR, that accused 'B' used filthy language against non-applicant 'X' on a WhatsApp group of which applicant 'A' was an administrator, that despite accused 'B' using filthy language against the non-applicant "X', applicant had not taken any action against accused 'B'.

Further, it was alleged that the applicant 'A' being the administrator had not removed nor deleted accused 'B' from the WhatsApp Group.

In view of the above, non-applicant 'X' lodged the FIR against the applicant 'A' and accused 'B'.

Hence, the applicant 'A' has, filed a present application challenging filing of charge-sheet and continuation of proceedings against the applicant 'A'.

# FACTS OF THE CASE

Mr. X and Mr. Y are citizens of India. Both had gone to Ireland to pursue higher education and subsequently started working in Ireland. They were already into a relationship and eventually got married according to the Irish Laws during their stay. They were in martial relationship for two years and were residing in Ireland. On 15th September 2017 they returned to India. They both started staying in an apartment in Bandra, Mumbai.

On 10th September 2018, Mr. X left the apartment and went on to stay separately without informing Mr. Y.

Despite several attempts of contact from Y, Mr. X did not respond. With no other option left, Mr. Y tried filing a case but was not allowed to do it. Aggrieved by this, Mr. Y approached an NGO named Citizens for Human Rights.

Citizens for Human Rights works and fights for the rights of LGBTQI [Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Transgender, Queer, and Intersex] section of society in India.


Citizens for Human Rights after consultation with their panel of legal experts who through their research on the recent landmark judgment dated 6th September, 2018, suggested that Section 377 of the Indian Penal Code was decriminalized. In the abovementioned case, the Supreme Court found that Section 377, so far as it relates to consensual sex between adults, violates the right of members of the LGBTQI community with regard to dignity, identity and privacy, all covered under Article 21 and Article 19 (1)(a) of the Constitution of India.

As plethora of issues are related with recognition of same sex marriage such as Domestic Violence, Cruelty and Maintenance, Citizens for Human Rights filed a writ Petition against Union of India in the Hon'ble Supreme Court Seeking the recognition and validity of same sex marriage and gender equality.

The Union of Indiyana included the state of Vshmir on 26th October 1947 by the instrument of accession.

Mohd. Ali Deena and few political leaders opposed the said instrument and signed Shahjahanabad agreement, 1952 deciding terms and conditions of Instrument Accession.

The Presidential Order of 1954 made Art. 370 "temporary and special provision" for the state of Vshmir. Art. 35A was inserted in the Constitution of Indiyana for the state of Vshmir on 14<sup>th</sup> May 1954 which gave rights of permanent residence to the citizens of Vashmir. The Presidential Order on 5th August 2019 removed Art. 370 and Art. 35A and it was declared that the Constitution of Indiyana will be applicable in its entirety to the state of Vshmir without any special provision making the separate constitution of Vshmir inoperative.

Protection of Basic Human Rights, an NGO filed a petition u/aunder Article 32 of the Constitution of Indiyana stating that the said order of President has infringed the rights of people of Vshmir. Hence the petition was filed to declare the Abrogation of Article 370 and 35A was unconstitutional and not according to due procedure of law.

# Problem for The Internal Moot Court Competition 2017-18

### Facts:

Union of Hindustan was riddled by the Corruption and other problems like terrorism and generation of black money. To control such problems on 11<sup>th</sup> of November the Prime Minister of Hindustan Mr. A declared at 9.00 °O' Clock in the evening that the currency notes of Rs. 500/- and Rs. 1000/- are demonetized. He asked all the citizens to exchange their old notes with fresh ones but the new denomination of the notes was Rs. 500/- and Rs. 2000/-.

The Central Fund of Hindustan, a top body which controlled the banking system and currency exchange, only allowed the National banks to offer facility for exchanging the currency notes. The national banks were directed to dispense and exchange the fresh currency notes after submission of KYC documents by the citizens. The limit of Rs. 24000/- per week was placed for withdrawal of money per person as the currency notes were not adequately printed in advance to keep the policy secret.

In State of Minar the Cooperative banks were established at every level. The national banks were established at city level predominantly and rarely in rural areas. The cooperative banks used to cater the agrarian communities in rural areas. The Central Fund of the Hindustan prohibited cooperative banks to exchange the currency notes and also prohibited the withdrawal facility to its account holders of amount of 24000/- per week.

The Central Association of Co-operative banks in State of Minar, approached Supreme Court against the said notification and control placed on them for being unconstitutional.

### Problem for The Internal Moot Court Competition

### 2018-19

### Facts

The State of Mahamitra is a progressive welfare state. The State received independence in 1947, from United Crueldom. State adopted its constitution in 1950, making it Sovereign, Democratic and Republic. The State passed law in 1988 namely Motor Vehicles Act for Registration of Vehicles, issue of License and providing penalties for certain offences

Over the years, the law proved to be ineffective and one of the reasons was that the penalties were not deterrent enough. Hence the Government in 2019 amended the said law and increased various penalties for violations of law at least ten times of original fines. It also provided vicarious criminal liability for guardians, if juveniles committed offence under the Act.

Center of Civil rights (CCR), NGO filed a petition in the Supreme Court challenging the amendments which provided enhanced penalties and vicarious criminal liability for the guardian.

### **Problem for The Internal Moot Court Competition**

### 2020-21

### Facts

A public spirited NGO, Forum for Civil Liberties (FCL), which worked in espousing causes of downtrodden masses in the State of Indistan. The said NGO predominantly worked for the advancement of the rights of women. The said NGO also represented estranged women in courts, across the nation. It received a complaint from one Mrs. A. Said Mrs. A had returned to her parent's house, due to physical abuse in matrimonial home. Her Husband had approached family court and filed petition for restitution of conjugal rights. The family court was pleased to pass order directing Mrs. A to return to her matrimonial home. She was not ready to go back to her matrimonial house as she feared for her life. Also she had no intention to give divorce to her husband. Her economic condition was not good and hence the family court had ordered maintenance to be given to her, by the husband. After discussing with Mrs. A through their representative, the concerned NGO filed Public interest litigation in the Supreme Court under Art 32 of the constitution. The provision of Restitution of Conjugal rights was challenged by filing petition as it compromised fundamental rights of citizens.

Moot Court Problem

### Shyam Shinde v State of Kalki

The Union of Chalukya is located in the South Asian Region of Asia. It is one of the ancient nations in the world. It is a democratic country with a written Constitution and having 28 States and 8 Union Territories.

The legal system of Union Chalukya is similar to India and the mooters have to frame the issues and make submissions by presuming that the Constitution of India and all other laws applicable in India are applicable to Union of Chalukya.

Kalki is one of the few Chalukya States the Legislature whereof has two houses, i.e., the Legislative Assembly and the Legislative Council. The Legislative Assembly is comprised of 288 members, who are chosen by direct election from territorial constituencies in the State. Article 171(1) of the Constitution ordains that the total number of members in the Legislative Council shall not exceed one-third of the total number of members in the Legislative Assembly of that State whereas, the proviso thereto, ordains that the number of members in any case shall not be less than forty. Clause (2) of Article 171 of the Constitution ordains that until Parliament by law otherwise provides, the composition of the Legislative Council of a State shall be as provided in clause (3).

Section 10 of the 1950 Act read with the Third Schedule thereof is the law enacted by the Parliament, which now provides for the allocation of seats in the Legislative Councils. In terms of such provision, the number of members of the Legislative Council of Kalki shall be 78, of whom 22, 7, 7 and 30 members shall be elected in terms of sub-clauses (a), (b), (c) and (d) of clause (3) of Article 171, respectively, totalling 66. The remainder, i.e., 12 members are to be nominated by the Governor in accordance with clause (5) of Article 171 of the Constitution. The term of all the 12 members nominated earlier ended by efflux of time. By June 16, 2020 all the seats were vacant. Resultantly, the Council of Ministers met on October 29, 2021 and unanimously resolved to render appropriate aid and advice to the Governor. In such meeting, the Council of Ministers decided to recommend names of 12 individuals, who did not incur disqualification under Article 191 of the Constitution, to the Governor for nomination in terms of clause (5) of Article 171 thereof. The Chief Minister of Kalki followed up this decision by forwarding, on November 6, 2021, the names of the said 12 individuals to the Governor of Kalki for such nomination.

### Rules:

- A. Each team shall comprise of two members consisting of two Mooters. Each participant has to give mobile number linked with his/her Whatsapp account at the time of enrolment.
- B. In the preliminary rounds, each team (both speakers) shall compulsorily present oral arguments for the side mentioned in their registration form (either Petitioner or Respondent).
- C. In the preliminary round each team will be allotted 20 minutes (16 minutes for arguments and 4 minutes for rebuttal and answering questions asked by judges. The rebuttal cannot be claimed as a matter of right).
- D. The final round will comprise of the top four teams of the preliminary rounds.
- E. The Competition starts at 9.00 a.m. virtually (online)

Internal Moot Court Competition 2022-23

#### Moot Court Problem

The Union of Magadh is located in the South Asian Region of Asia. It is one of the ancient nations in the world. It is a democratic country with a written Constitution and having 28 States and 8 Union Territories. The legal system of Union of Magadh is similar to India and the mooters have to frame the issues and make submissions by presuming that the Constitution of India and all other laws applicable in India are applicable to Union of Magadh and the state of Devrashtra is similar to the state of Maharashtra.

Children are considered the greatest asset of any society or Nation that is why children should be grown as responsible citizens, mentally alert, physically fit, and morally healthy so they can contribute to the betterment of society. The primary goal of the Indian juvenile justice system is to rehabilitate juvenile offenders and offer them a second opportunity. There are several causes for which youngsters engage in illegal activities. The primary reason is that their brains are not completely grown and they lack a mature sense of good and wrong.

On 9<sup>th</sup> August, 2017 the Commissioner of Women and Child Development (CWC), Devrashtra State, Dist. Sitapur, issued a circular to all Child Welfare Committees providing certain guidelines regarding admission of juveniles in need of care and protection and directions for preventing misuse of the said provision by children having one or two parents capable of taking care of the children. On the basis of the circular that was issued by CWC, Sitapur, CWC of Meghapur also issued the order whereby the admissions of juveniles having one or two parents were cancelled with the direction to deliver custody of such children/juveniles to their parents and producing only orphans for admissions. This was done in light of the fact that the circular was issued by CWC, Sitapur.

One Mhadu and Sunanda did not have a stable source of income and shelter. They have a kid named Manglu who was eleven years old. They made the difficult decision to hand over him to the Children's Home so that he might get further care there. The Children's home of Meghapur rejected the admission of Manglu, and therefore the circumstances compelled Mhadu and Sunanda to keep Manglu with them. A short time afterwards, Manglu passed away as a result of severe malnutrition and starvation.

The circular from the Commissioner of Women and Child Development, Devrashtra State, Sitapur, dated August 9, 2017, has been challenged by the "Human Rights Protector", which is a non-government organization that works to care for and protect children. The NGO claims that the circular is illegal, arbitrary, and without the authority of law. An NGO also claims that the circular is against the Constitution of Magadh and the Juvenile Justice (Care & Protection of Children) Act, 2015 (herein after referred to as "Juvenicle Justice Act") and seeks quashing of the same.

- g. Arguments advanced
- h. Prayer

Hon'ble Shri. S. R. Navandar (District Judge 6 and Additional Sessions Judge, Pune) in his inaugural speech, he explained the benefits of




participation in moot court in the life of law student and emphasized that every student of law should read not only law books but also novels and other readings to gain knowledge and achieve success in the legal profession.

#### PROBLEM:

Nitu booked air tickets online from Chandigarh to Pune for her and her family members through the website Travelkaro.com for travel from Amritsar to Pune on 23.09.2021 for the purpose of attaining a wedding ceremony of her Cousin Meenal on 25.09.21 and also scheduled her return journey from Pune to Kolkata and the connecting flight of the opposite party AB Airlines M/s Spice jet Ltd. from Kolkata to Amritsar for 30.09.2021. An amount of Rs. 70,000/was paid by Nitu through her debit card on 12.09.2021 for the said tickets. Nitu started her return journey on 30.09.2021 from Pune to Kolkata by Vindigo Airlines and reached the airport at Kolkata at 1.30 pm to board the connecting flight of the AB Airlines from Kolkata to Amritsar, scheduled for 20.40 hours. Nitu's family members were having the boarding passes for the said flight. However, they were shocked to know that the said flight of the AB Airlines had been cancelled. The AB Airlines did not provide any alternative arrangement to Nitu and her family for travel to New Delhi. The AB airlines in response to Nitu said that, "The passengers travelling in the airlines are governed by the terms of carriage, contained in the eticket, framed in accordance with Vindigo Carriage Rules. One of the clause of that Rule was that if the flight was cancelled or delayed, the airlines may assist the passengers to get to the destination, but shall not be liable in any way for the delay or cancellation. The learned counsel for the petitioner stated that the e-ticket issued to the passenger was a concluded contract between the parties and hence, they were bound to follow the terms and conditions of the said contract. The flight in question was cancelled due to operational and technical reasons, which were beyond the control of the AB Airlines."

Nitu was, therefore, forced to buy tickets for another flight, operated by the Net Airways from Kolkata to Mumbai, with connecting flight to Amritsar, departing at 20.40 hours from Kolkata. Nitu spent an amount of Rs. 80,000/- for five tickets for the said journey. Nitu and her family reached Amritsar by the said flight, but they missed the Tolvo bus, which was supposed to



carry them to Chandigarh. It is stated that the Nitu and her family were scheduled to reach Amritsar at 22.50 hours on 30.09.2021, but due to the cancellation of the flight of the AB Airlines and travelling by another flight, they reached Amritsar at 5 am on 01.10.2021 and consequently, they were late in reaching Chandigarh. The ABs did not refund the fare charged from them for the cancelled flight, neither they provided another alternative flight. Advice and assist Nitu.

- To help the person decide on his or her own solutions.


To meet with these needs the Department has organized the said competition.





























### Final Round:

They created WhatsApp groups in which my morphed pictures were posted, I was targeted with indecent comments due to which I was laughed and ridiculed upon. I was the only beautiful girl contesting elections amongst all the female candidates and also an all-rounder and enthusiastic personality along with meritorious records and remarkable social work.

My beauty and brain being used to her disadvantage, my competitor wanted me to stand with him in the election panel because my beauty and brain could get him votes. As I denied the same, false things were spread regarding me that vote for me because I am a woman of easy virtue. When I was on a visit while travelling by a bus, one man purposely tried to come close to me resulting in unwelcomed touching. One of my competitors also bullied me to send her pictures to the other men which I have rejected. I was continuously stalked. All this led me to trauma and fear. Also, undue influence was used by the winner of elections to get votes by threatening me. I was defamed to have several affairs just because I had overall good contacts with the men colleagues as I was the only one who had the ability to sit and deal with the male colleagues.

The worst part of all this was that I tried to take all the other women in confidence but nobody understood by me. All this resulting in the mental suffering for me amounting to High Blood Pressure. I belonged to a very well reputed family and was the only daughter of a big businessman. I being unmarried then and going against competitors would affect my own image and would question the family's repute making me to keep quiet. I was gathering all the evidences all alone. Now, that I am married and my husband completely believes in my wish to raise a voice against all this because my husband opines that tolerating injustice is even more greater than Injustice itself.

Please advise and assist me in this process of raising of a voice.



## What Is Privacy?

The term privacy seems to have been derived from the Latin word Privatus, Which means isolated, restricted, personal or peculiar.

- (Traupman, 1995)

It is the right of the individual to determine when, how, and to what extent there should be disclosure of the information.

- (Westin, 1967)

### Legal or Philosophical Viewpoints on Privacy

- In India majority understand Privacy only in context of Sex and Wealth. Sometimes with password too
- Privacy is control over information or activities relating to oneself; Privacy can be considered as a "derivative" right i.e. privacy right is derived from other related rights;
- Indian culture is more about sharing. Everyone wants to know everything. Decisions are typically taken by elders in the family. Privacy is viewed more as a tort.
- The right of privacy in the light of constitution restricting unauthorized searches and seizures
- A viewpoint that privacy is not a basic requirement of our society

- (Ebenger, 2004)

### Case Law

The Supreme court in the cased of **R. Rajagopal V. State of Tamil Nadu**, for the first time directly linked the right to privacy to Article 21 of the Constitution and laid down:

"The right to privacy is implicit in the right to life and liberty guaranteed to the citizens of this country by Article 21. It is a "right to be let alone". A citizen has aright to safeguard the privacy of his own, his family, marriage, procreation, motherhood, child bearing and education among other matters. None can publish anything concerning the above matters without his consent whether truthful or otherwise and whether laudatory or critical. If he does so, he would be violating the right to privacy of the person concerned and would be liable in an action for damages."

R. Rajagopal v. State of Tamil Nadu, cited at: 1994 SCC (6) 632.

### Case Law

The Supreme Court in the case of *Ram Jethmalani v. Union of India* categorically held that the right to privacy also requires the state not to make public any private information about an individual, which would violate her privacy.

Ram Jethmalani v. Union of India, cited at: (2011) 8 SCC1.

### Privacy Law as it Stands in India

The Information Technology Act, 2000 have two sections relating to Privacy:

- Section 43A, which deals with implementation of reasonable security practices for sensitive personal data or information and provides for the compensation of the person affected by wrongful lessor wrongful gain.
- Section 72A, which provides for imprisonment for a period up to 3 years and/or a fine up to Rs. 5,00,000for a person who causes wrongful loss or wrongful gain by disclosing personal information of another person while providing services under the terms of lawful contract.

### Privacy Of Fundamental Rights

Citizens could not claim right to privacy as a fundamental right is the Government's stand.

- Supreme Court would decide in due course in the light of Article 21 whether it is a fundamental right.
- Or The Supreme Court relies on eight-judge bench decision which in1954 ruled that right to privacy was not a fundamental right

### Invasion of Privacy

According to the eminent US law scholar William L. Prosser (1960), the invasion of privacy would deem to have occurred under the following four claims:

### 1. Intrusion upon Solitude or Seclusion, or into Private Affairs:

It would be considered a liability if the intrusion is not acceptable to a "reasonable person".

### 2. Public Disclosure of Embarrassing Facts:

"The matter made public must be one which would be offensive and objectionable to a reasonable man of ordinary

(Prosser, 1960)

### Invasion of Privacy

#### 3. Publicity in the False Light in the Public Eye:

Any false comments or opinions that are misleading and that cause a bad reputation ("false light") can be sued for violation of privacy.

### 4. Appropriation of Name of Likeness for Advantage:

If anyone uses the name or likeness for benefit without consent may result in plaintiff claiming damages.

### Social Networking Sites

With the proliferation of networking sites, the use of social media has become mainstream.

-(Madden, 2012)

Even in the usage of social networking sites lay the basic privacy requirements, and users use the privacy settings of the social networking site to balance the competing desires of privacy and publicity.

-(Metzger & Pure, 2009)

### Apple vs. FBI - Intl Case Law

The legal battle focused on two aspects: the perceived privacy and the deemed security for the citizens.

In Apple's opinion, the desire to create a computer program that would alter the technical controls implemented for the protection of information amount to creating a back-door that could also be used by the hackers to compromise the security of devices used by other customers.

Theoretically, a process known as "Decapping" might allow recovering the cryptographic keys from the device by physical intervention in the transistors and other micro hardware elements.

In FBI's opinion, the information obtained from a device used by the terrorist could provide valuable clues and links regarding the terrorist network, thereby diminishing the probability of more attacks on the citizens.


### Apple V FBI (Considerations)

- The technology companies will deliberately try to modify the security mechanism of their devices such that it would be impossible to access the contents of the device, even with a custom created computer program.
- It has now become public information that security of the specific model of iPhone can be compromised as FBI has publicly stated that it has managed to gain access to the device used by the terrorist.
- Will government move in the direction of creating legislation where it would be mandatory for the technology companies to keep a back-door?

### Conclusion

- The concept of privacy is very fluid, and the laws related to this topic are murky and subjective.
- The rise of social media and other social networking sites have resulted in users voluntarily or involuntary disclosing Private information to the public.
- In India we need cultural revolution to decimate idea of Privacy.
- If The Privacy Protection Bill becomes Law, India would need mass awareness program to enlighten citizens and Netizens.






## Distinction

### **Debentures**

- Debentureholders : Creditors of the company

#### INTRODUCTION


One of the key <u>features of a Company</u> is that its shares are transferable. Privileges of a shareholder include his/her rights to transfer shares. If a Company is limited by assurance and has no share capital, no transfer of share is involved as there are no shares to transfer.

#### MEANING OF SHARES

Transfer of shares means the voluntary handing over of the rights and duties of member from a shareholder who wishes to not be a member of company anymore to a person who wishes of becoming a member.




#### PROCEDURE OF TRANSFER OF SHARES

- \* Share transfer deed is an intrument of transfer
- \* Transfer deed must me executed by both transferor and transferee
- \* It must me stamped, dated and executed
- \* It must me delivered to company
- \* within a period of 60 days from the date of execution
- \* Along with the security certificate or letter of allotment of securities



### Acknowledgement

- \* Some companies send a notice or acknowledgement of the instrument to the transferor who has lodged a transfer with the company before the documents are scrutinized.
- \* The notice of acknowledgement is usually in the form of a letter which holds a checklist for scrutiny of the transfer documents.




### Scrutiny

\*On receipt of all the transfer documents, a scrutiny should be done to ensure that all the documents are in place.

\*The scrutiny should be done within 3 to 5 days from the receipt of the transfer documents.

\*In case the documents are not acceptable, the same should be returned to the transferee.



### Approval


- \* Every transfer of shares must be placed before the Board of Directors or committee for its approval.
- \* The registration takes place after approval. If everything is accepted after scrutiny, it should be approved by the right authority.
- \* Transfer of shares must be approved by the board

### Registration

Registration of share transfer is a requirement for the transferee obtaining the status of a member of the company.

A transfer is incomplete without registration of share transfer.

Once the company approves and registers the transfer, this leads to the entry of the transferee's name in the registry of the member and it qualifies his status as a member.





### **Delivery of Share Certificate**

Transfer becomes effective only on registration of such shares by the company.

The company shall deliver the <u>share certificate</u> within 1 month from the receipt by the company's instrument related to transfer.

The relatively new field of law, science, and technology seeks to study systematically the diverse ways law interacts with science and technology. Law, science, and technology has been defined as "the discipline that deals with how our legal system can and must adjust to accommodate the problems created by the ever more urgent and ubiquitous impact of technology on society There is also a growing awareness of the importance of scientific and technological developments by legal practitioners and scholars, with increased recognition among those outside the legal profession for the central importance of law in mediating the risks, benefits, and ethics of technology.

# THE ROLE OF LAW IN MANAGING THE IMPACTS OF SCIENCE AND TECHNOLOGY



- Law plays a primary role in managing the impacts of science and technology. The impacts of science and technology that law seeks to manage can be subdivided into (a) risks, (b) benefits, and (c) ethical implications.
- CONTROLLING RISKS OF NEW TECHNOLOGIES. New and existing technologies create many known and potential health, safety, environmental, and socioeconomic risks. Law is the principal societal institution for controlling these risks, through legislatures, regulators, and the judiciary. In developing such controls, the law relies on science to assess the relevant risks. Risk regulation thus involves two levels of science-law interactions: the role of law in regulating risks from science and technology; and the use of science by law to assess risk from new and existing technologies

## EFFECTS OF SCIENCE AND TECHNOLOGY ON THE PRACTICE OF LAW.


 Scientific and technological advances have both substantive and procedural effects on the law. On the substantive side, new scientific evidence and techniques can change the way legal claims are resolved, including their outcomes. For example, forensic DNA evidence has fundamentally changed criminal law and paternity disputes by greatly improving the veracity of legal fact finding, while creating a plethora of new legal, ethical, and social issues .In criminal cases, forensic DNA has helped identify and convict guilty persons who might have otherwise escaped prosecution, and exonerated innocent persons accused or convicted. But this powerful forensic tool raises new issues, such as how and from whom DNA samples should be collected and stored, how genetic information may be used, and when convicted criminals should be permitted to reopen cases based on new DNA evidence.

## EFFECTS OF LAW ON THE PRACTICE OF SCIENCE

According to Justice Breyer, "science depends on sound law-law that at a minimum supports science by offering the scientist breathing space, within which he or she may search freely for the truth on which all knowledge depends Until recently, law rarely intruded into the inner sanctum of the space it created for science. Investigations of claims of science misconduct have become more frequent and legalistic, as government investigators adopt adversarial and formal procedures approaching those used by criminal prosecutors. Individuals claiming to have been aggrieved by scientific misconduct or allegedly false claims of scientific misconduct frequently seek judicial remedies. Attorneys have even served non-party subpoenas on scientists who are doing research potentially relevant to a pending lawsuit, even if the subpoenaed scientists have no relationship to the litigation or any of the parties.

## CONCLUSION

• The law interacts with science and technology in diverse ways. These interactions will proliferate in the future with advancing technologies that present novel risk, benefit, and ethical scenarios. The nascent legal field of law, science, and technology seeks to provide a systematic treatment of these actions, and will grow and evolve in parallel and apace with its subject

As a part of value addition to the curriculum the college organized the high court visit to the High court of Judicature, Bombay at Mumbai.


The said visit was organized on 7<sup>th</sup> March 2019. Total 76 students (44 gents 30 ladies) participated in this study tour.

Report District court visit 2019-20

The college organizes visits for the students to various places to give them insights about actual working of the law. The college had organized a visit to Pune District and Sessions court at Shivajinagar for the students of third year of LLB (207) and fifth year of BSL LLB (83) on 9<sup>th</sup> August 2019. Total 290 students participated in the said visit.

The students were divided into groups and they were shown offices and procedures in the courts. One group was shown procedure relating to civil case and simultaneously other gro0up was shown procedure relating to criminal courts.


