#### REPORT ON THE FEED BACK FORM - 2017-2018

In order to get feedback response from the students about the various academic, co-curricular and other activities in the College, a well-structured feedback form was obtained from the students of college. In the current academic year i.e., 2017-18, the feedback forms were filled in by the students before the examination. The analysis of the feedback forms is as under:

There were total thirteen questions asked in the feedback form. Out of 13 questions, the first 3 questions were related to the nature of syllabus, its adequacy or otherwise and how much syllabus was covered in the class. Eight questions (from question 4 to 11) dealt with the ability of teachers to teach, his preparation in the class-room, role and approach of teacher in encouraging the students to learn, teaching-learning methods etc. The 12<sup>th</sup> question was about the overall assistance received from the non-teaching or administrative staff of the College. The last 13<sup>th</sup> question was for the general comments of the students about the infrastructure provided by the college in terms of library, sports, canteen, and computer library etc.

About 54% students found the syllabus adequate for each course. For 10 per cent of students it was manageable and for 12 per cent it was easy to understand. About 36 per cent students found it challenging and 4 per cent found it slightly diffic82ult. According to 82 per cent students, the concerned teachers covered the syllabus to the extent of 85 to 100 per cent and the material provided by them was adequate to understand the subject. For 52 per cent students, material for prescribed reading viz. books, reference books etc. was available easily whereas 44 per cent students get the said material with some difficulty.

As regards the preparation of the teachers, around 70 per cent students stated that teachers were preparing thoroughly and were able to communicate very effectively. The most of the teachers involved the students in group discussion and encouraged them to put forward their quarries and difficulties etc. The advise provided by the teachers was found to be very helpful by around 62 per cent students. For 72 per cent students, overall teachers' approach was always courteous.

According to 46 per cent students, they get regular assistance from the non-teaching and administrative staff of the College, whereas for 42 per cent students it was occasional.

As regards the last questions (General comments on infrastructure and other facilities provided by the college) most of the students were happy. However, few students were not happy and made critical comments. The summary of such comments is as under: -



- A handful number of students complained about the lack of discipline in the library. According to them, there is too much noise in the library. Sincere students cannot concentrate on their studies.
- 2. There are number of complaints about low internet speed in the computer Laboratory.
- 3. The students have suggested that there should be a separate canteen for the law college.
- 4. Gym facilities should be provided, Sport facility is minimal.
- 5. Although the students have drinking water facility on each floor of the college, some students were apprehensive about its cleanliness.

According to 70 per cent students, they get regular assistance from the non-teaching and administrative staff of the College, whereas for 22 per cent students it was occasional.

As regards the last questions (General comments on infrastructure and other facilities provided by the college) most of the students were happy. However, few students were not happy and made critical comments. The summary of such comments is as under: -












8. How far does the teacher encourage students' participation in class? 129 responses



9. If answer of question 8 is 'YES', which of the following methods were used? 122 responses




10. How much helpful were teachers in academic counseling? 129 responses







11. The teachers approach can best be described as -129 responses



12. Fairness of the internal evaluation process by the teachers is - 129 responses







For 60 per cent students the institute takes active interest in promoting internship and field visits as well as the institute provides multiple opportunities to learn and grow. According to 74 per cent students the teachers inform them about their expected competencies, course outcomes and programme outcomes.



According to 92 per cent students, they get regular assistance from the non-teaching and administrative staff of the college whereas for 5 per cent students it was occasional.

As regards the last questions (General comments on infrastructure and other facilities provided by the college) most of the students were happy. However, few students were not happy and made critical comments. The summary of such comments is as under: -

- Few students complained about the lack of discipline in the library. According to them, there is too much noise in the library. Sincere students cannot concentrate on their studies.
- 2. The students have suggested that there should be a separate canteen for the law college.
- 3. Sport facility should be increased.
- 4. The library and computer laboratory timings should be increased.
- 5. Few students want that the classroom teaching should always be in English only.

After collection of the feedback-forms, they are analysed on the touchstone of given parameters and a report is prepared. With regard to the last question (Question.20 – General comments and suggestion), important suggestions are discussed by the principal with the faculties. After discussion appropriate action is taken to address the suggestions given by students.

### ACADEMIC YEARS 2017-18 TO 2021-22






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
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### HOW WAS THE COURSE PROGRAMME?




#### HOW MUCH SYLLABUS WAS COVERED IN THE CLASS?




